


IT'S ALL ABOUT THE Los Angeles Crimes

This dataset covers reported crimes in Los Angeles since 2020. It reflects trends over time and supports public safety and policy analysis.

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WEAPONS USED IN LA CRIMES

Most crimes (65%) have no weapon type reported. Of known cases, impact weapons are most common, followed by firearms and blades.

CRIME BREAKDOWN BY TYPE – 2023

Property and violent crimes lead. Slight YoY changes across most categories.

01

Property Crimes

The most common crime category, showing a slight +0.07% YoY increase.

02

Violent Crimes

Slight rise of +0.03% YoY suggests ongoing safety concerns.

03

Vehicle Crimes

Covers stolen vehicles. Decreased by -0.03% YoY, but still a major urban issue.


04

Public Order

Increased by +0.07% YoY, showing a small upward trend.

MALE VICTIM RATIO

Men accounted for the largest share of reported victims - 41%.




CRIMES UNDER INVESTIGATION



CRIME TREND (2020–2023)

Crime cases rose steadily from 2020 to 2022, peaking at over 235K. In 2023, the trend slightly reversed with a small decline of 0.2%.
